Peace was declared at midnight, anding formally the state of war which had existed since December 7, 1941.

The peace treaty simultaneously came into force between Japan and Argentina, Austra-lia, Canada, France, Mexico, New Zealand,

Pakistan, the United Kingdom and the United States.

India, which did not sign the treaty, also yesterday announced that her state of war with Japan was ended.

Thirty-eight other nations signed the peace treaty at San Francisco. It will become effective for them as they complete the ratification

In Tokyo, Mr. Yoshida, Premier of Japan, said: "At long last we are free. We are inde

pendent. Japan new joins the family of nations as a sovereign equal.

"In making our new start today, our people know that no nation can live unto itself, that no nation can draw dividends unless it contri-butes to a common world effort and invests in the common welfare of humanity."

Mr. Casey, Australian Minister for External Affairs, said:

"The Australian people will not forget the
