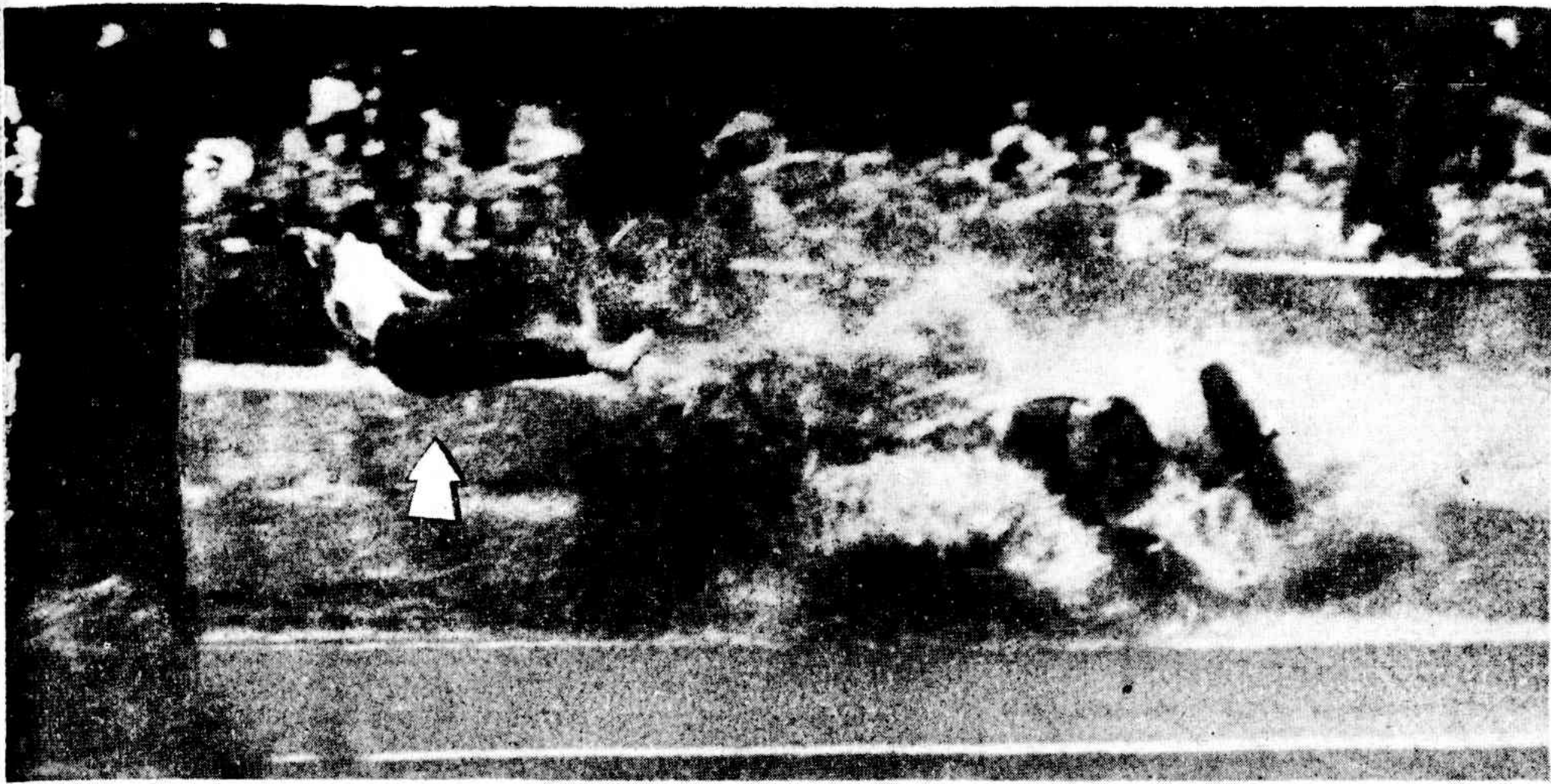


# RACE FANS SEE DRIVER HURT IN CRASH

## Moss wins big race

A driver was critically injured and several others had narrow escapes in crashes in the motor-car races round Albert Park Lake yesterday.

A crowd of more than 150,000 saw world-famous driver, Stirling Moss, win the 100-mile Australian Tourist Trophy.

The injured driver was Peter Catlin, 32, married, of Grosvenor st., Brighton.

He received multiple fractures and a perforated stomach.

He crashed early in the first race — a 50-mile.

Earlier in the race Catlin, driving a super-charged Bugatti, narrowly missed striking the protective hay bales barrier at Jaguar bend, at the South Melbourne end of the course.

At Midford corner, another mile on, near the St. Kilda cricket ground, he again appeared to take the bend too wide.

The car then crashed into the hay bales, threw him out, rebounded and rolled on to him.

### Five cars crashed

Five cars crashed through the hay bales at Jaguar bend later in the day.

In the first race H. B. Thompson's Edelbrock slid to the left coming out of the corner, hit the kerb, and then hit the bales around a pole.

Neil Charge, the winner, also had trouble when his car went into a series of slides as he braked. His car dived into the bales, and on its way out spun to a stop almost in the centre of the track.

There was a gasp when Wade's Austin Special ended a series of slides through the curve with a spin into the bales and turned over, with the driver still in his seat.

Len Lukey also went into a haystack there in the KLG Touring Car Handicap, when he was well in the lead on his last lap, with only 300 yards to finish.

When David McKay and Lou Kingsley (Mercedes) hit the corner almost simultaneously, there was a near collision, saved by McKay putting his car into a masterly spin, which brought it out facing the right way and causing no damage.

### Moss sets new record

In the 100-mile race, Stirling Moss, 27, reached speeds of up to 160 m.p.h. Although driving a sports car, a Maserati 300S, he completed his fastest lap in 1m. 55.8-10sec — smashing the record of 1.59 set up by a racing car.

His win was regarded as one of the finest exhibitions of race driving seen in Melbourne.

Thirty-five-year-old Jean Behra, leading French driver, in a Maserati 300S, was second — nearly a minute behind Moss.

Driving a Ferrari 750A, Ken Wharton, of Britain, was third.

Stan Jones, who was expected to provide major Australian opposition to overseas drivers in the Bryson Industries Cup (25 miles for racing cars), was eliminated with the first few hundred yards when his 250F Maserati grazed a tree and was damaged.

## The mother who wants to forget . . .

### HER QUADS FAILED IN STRUGGLE FOR LIFE

SYDNEY, Sunday: Quadruplets born to a 21-year-old Bathurst mother yesterday died today in the Royal North Shore Hospital. They were 10 weeks premature.

The mother, Mrs. Kathleen Eslick, said today: "I just want to forget."

Her husband, Mr. Brian Eslick, a Bathurst carpenter said: "It's been a terrible shock, both to my wife and myself."

"I hoped that doctors might have been able to save one of them."

The quads, two boys and two girls — Cheryl, Karen, Alan, and Michael — were born within 25 minutes of each other last night.

They were placed in humidifiers immediately after their birth.

The smallest of the quads, Cheryl, who weighed only 1lb. 14oz., lived the longest. She died at 11 a.m. today.

Like a cloud . . .

Sister Morna Mulvogue, sister in charge of the maternity ward, said Cheryl put up a marvellous struggle to survive.

"But she was just too little. If she had been born only a fortnight later she might have pulled through."

"When she died it was as if a cloud had passed over the whole hospital."

The last baby born, Karen, who weighed 2lb., was the first to die, at 5.15 a.m. Alan, who weighed 2lb. 8oz., died at 6 a.m., and Michael, 2lb. 7oz., died at 9 a.m.

A doctor at the Royal North Shore Hospital said today it would have been a miracle if the quads had lived.

Mrs. Eslick has a 14-months-old daughter, Christine.

John Francis Morrison, 45, of Berham, N.S.W., was killed instantly on Saturday afternoon when his motorcycle struck a post on Koon-drook rd., near Kerang.

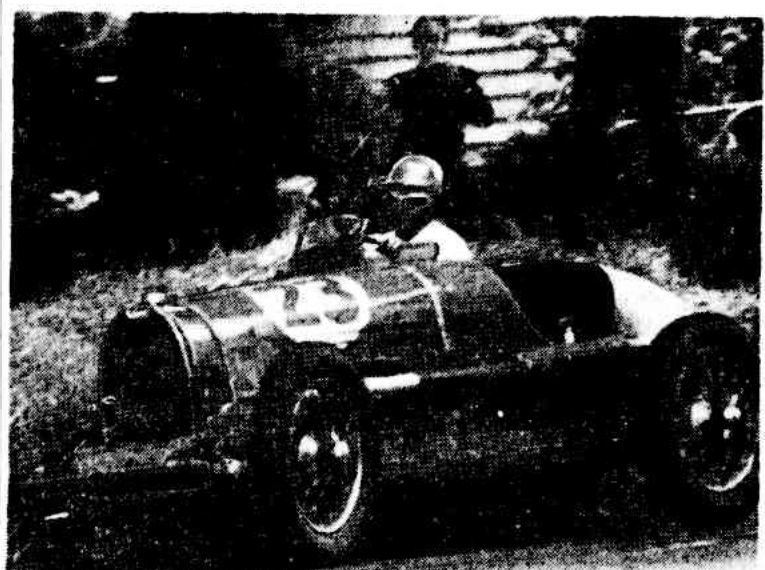

## Greeks rally to widow

Fellow Greeks are already rallying to help Mrs. Anne Tsiganes, whose husband, George, was killed last week.

Argus writer Hal Richardson's report of Mrs. Tsiganes' misfortune brought immediate response.

First gesture came yesterday when £14 7 was collected by Greek migrants at the Universal and the Castellorion social clubs in Melbourne.

Mr. Constantine Papal, one of the club members, said last night:

"We were deeply moved by The Argus story of Mrs. Tsiganes' loss."

"Nobody could fail to be moved by such a tragedy — especially during the Olympics when Greeks and Australians are being honored."

Tonight the Greek Orthodox community meets to discuss ways to ease Mrs. Tsiganes' burden and provide for her son Sam, who has not been told of his father's death.
